Four programs are now funded to help improve our Residents lives.

The first, is a grant HUD awarded WHA for the ROSS (Resident Opportunity and Self-Sufficiency Service) Coordinator position. The ROSS Coordinator, will assist all interested Residents in opportunities to achieve selfsufficiency.

The second program, WHA's Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) program was funded for another year. This vital grant program allows WHA staff that help remove identified barriers for Residents as they work toward selfsufficiency.

The fourth program, another vital service now offered, originates from WISH (Washington Initiative to Support Homeownership).



WISH was founded in a partnership with the City of Washington. This program will assist Residents in Public Housing and Participants in the Housing Choice Voucher program purchase their first home.

All who are part of this program will have the opportunity to repair & build their credit, receive down payment assistance for a home and more.

It's a joy to introduce new housing opportunities to the families we serve. These are just a few of the CHANGES underway at Washington **Housing Authority.**

Washington Housing Authority's (WHA) service to the City of Washington and Beaufort County extends beyond the housing we provide and the Housing Choice Voucher rental assistance we administer. WHA is committed to assisting low-income families become self-sufficient and ultimately independent of government assistance.

In 2021, the Torch Scholarship program was created to provide post-secondary educational financial assistance for graduating high school seniors currently residing in the following communities: Clifton Meadows, Eastern Village, Eastern Village Annex, Oakcrest, Old Fort, and Westbrooke.

High school seniors participating in the Housing Choice Voucher Program (HCV/ Section 8) are also eligible to apply.

Torch Scholarships will be awarded annually (beginning in Spring 2022) to graduating high school seniors attending a university, community college or technical school on a full-time or part-time basis.

Qualified applicants must complete an application, which includes an essay on long-term goals, and provide a letter of recommendation from a teacher, guidance counselor or staff person (that is not a member of the Torch Scholarship Committee) and a copy of a recent transcript (unofficial transcripts are accepted). Applicants must have a minimum GPA of 2.5 to be eligible for consideration.



New Programs



Background

The Washington Housing Authority (WHA) has served the City of Washington and Beaufort County since 1961. As of 2021, WHA serves over 1000 residents in the City of Washington and Beaufort County ensuring the most vulnerable have access to safe, decent, sanitary, and affordable housing. These residents reside in our Low-Income Public Housing (LIPH) or participate in the WHA Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) program. As one of the largest providers of low-income affordable housing in the area, the WHA created a viable partnership with the City of Washington to expand homeownership within the City of Washington and Beaufort County.

The Washington Initiative to Support Homeownership (WISH)

Homeownership has been the vehicle used to build wealth in our country since its inception. However, there are groups of people that have been historically unable to gain access to the dream of homeownership. WHA is seeking to change this narrative for the families we serve.

WISH

The WISH program assists families that participate in the WHA HCV program and LIPH program with the following:

- · Credit repair & down payment assistance
- · Rehabilitation
- · Home repairs for existing homeowners on the HCV program (to keep families living in safe and decent housing)

Benefits of Homeownership

The benefits of homeownership for the families WHA serves:

- 1. Breaking the cycle of poverty; provides a pathway out of poverty.
- 2.Building generational wealth
- 3. Creates a sense of pride within the family and in the communities in which they live.

The benefits of homeownership for the City of Washington:

- 1.Expands existing tax base.
- 2.A tangible investment promoting affordable housing for the most vulnerable population in the City of Washington.



Overview

WHA administers NRP (Neighborhood Revitalization Program) through a partnership with the City of Washington. NRP provides moderate to low-income families the opportunity to purchase affordable housing on City and WHA-owned lots.

These lots are located in the city limits to rehabilitate the housing stock within the inner city of Washington and to promote homeownership to citizens that may otherwise not have an opportunity to own a home of their own. At the core of this partnership is the desire to provide families with the opportunity to begin to build generational wealth while revitalizing the historical sections of the city.

Applicants to NRP must be current residents in the City of Washington, residents of Beaufort County, or residents of Low-Income Public Housing (LIPH) properties owned and managed by the Washington Housing Authority (WHA), participating the Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Program through WHA, or currently residing in Clifton Meadows, a USDA property owned and managed by Washington Housing Nonprofit Inc (WHNI). General eligibility requirements are featured on the WHA website.


